## Tackling financial challenges whilst improving accessibility and protecting neighbourhood policing

Your Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) Dafydd Llywelyn is responsible for setting the budget for Dyfed-Powys Police. This includes setting the precept, which is the element of council tax that goes towards your local police service.

After a process of extensive scrutiny, Dyfed-Powys Police and Crime Panel unanimously supported the PCC's precept proposal for 2024/25, which will increase the average Band D property by 6.2%. This equates to £19.38 per annum, approximately £1.62 per month.

There is a fine balance between addressing operational demands to ensure the safety of the public, whilst ensuring value for money for taxpayers and sound financial management. In setting the precept, the PCC considers an array of factors, including inflation and cost pressures, service demands, future investment requirements for critical infrastructure, efficiency and productivity plans as well as considering the level of reserves. The PCC also actively seeks feedback from residents of the Dyfed-Powys area recognising

the additional burden that any increase in the precept will place on taxpayers.

The challenges this year have been compounded by significant cuts to funding by Welsh Government for both Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) and the All-Wales Schools Programme. PCSOs are an integral and important part of neighbourhood policing and much valued by communities. The service and provision of the All-Wales Schools Programme also plays a critical role in maintaining and building a safe and secure environment for children and young people. This budget continues to support these vital services for the coming year.

It has also been recognised that investment is required within the Force's Communication Centre so that Dyfed-Powys Police can respond effectively and efficiently to growing demands. For many this is the first point of contact with the police, and ensuring the accessibility of services for the public is a priority for the Force.

The Police and Crime Commissioner and Chief Constable are committed to ensuring an efficient and effective service for the public. They are confident that this increase is necessary to safeguarding the safety and well-being of our neighbourhoods.
